

BCH Ride at Gunlock Reservoir

Thirteen riders arrived at pump house 7 where we parked our rigs and prepared for the ride on what looked like a beautiful day, but you cannot always tell a book by it's cover (more later). Arriving today were Freddy Dunn our ride leader and Larry Dunn, Keith Christensen, Jeanette Blasdell, Chuck Schicht, Chris Hall, Richard Boschee, Susan Hansen, Dennis Peters, and three riders who were trying us out for the first time Kathy Rice, Ryan Jones & Jason Jones.

The ride started at the pump house then crossed the highway to a road that leads down to the river bottom. This portion of the ride is ever changing depending on the water flow activity during the previous winter season. This time we were confronted with more over growth of river bottom willows which required some brush bustin'. Once we were clear, we proceeded as planned on the river bottom then up the hill on two track roads until we got the the dam's spillway and we turned left and soon started making our own trails as we saw fit. This section of the ride has great red rock formations mixed in with Juniper trees and is fun to ride through. Once we reached the plateau we worked our way along a barbed wire fence built by the ranchers of the past dodging large Cholla cactus plants which are abundant in this area. Luckily no one came in contact with one.

Eventually we came to an open gate in the fence and again turned onto another two track road which lead us into a ravine that is exceptionally pretty to ride through featuring rock formations in a rainbow of colors. We stopped at our favorite lunch spot, tied up our mounts and found a good rock to sit on and ate our lunches.

This ravine takes us down to the lakes edge where we stopped and watered our horses. From there it is a scramble up the hill until we reached the top and picked up that two track road again which takes you along the ridge top and once again down to the lakes edge. It was about this time when it became obvious that the beautiful day was about to change. The blue skies turned black and the wind began to blow and the hats began to fly. It was a race to get back to the rigs before we got dumped on by the rain which was sure to arrive.

We did beat the rain back but the wind continued to increase its velocity. Everyone was happy to get back to our rigs and stuff their mounts into their respective trailers and head out. We did not have the opportunity for the usual post ride visiting but three of us stopped at Veyo Pies where Richard Boechee treated us to a slice of pie. What a Guy!




















Trail crossing #1

This is the first water crossing heading east from the Equestrian camp grounds. Neither horse or hiker is very fond of crossing here. Many horses simply refuse to cross. A simple bridge would be a solution.

Pine Valley Trail Crossing #2

This is the second water crossing heading east from the Equestrian camp grounds, located about 300 yds south & east of camp site #23 at Crackfoot. The approach to the crossing is both dangerous and difficult for most horses. They must step between two large rocks and navigate a steep step down both at the same time. Plus the approach to the water is a side trail on a steep slope. Many a horse has refused this crossing

- Footbridge project in Pine Valley will be followed up by Paul.

Dear Park Constituent,

The National Park Service (NPS) is proposing to redesign the Zion National Park (ZION) South Entrance Fee Station and adjacent roadway to decrease park entry wait times for vehicular traffic, reduce localized vehicle congestion, improve employee safety, develop a renewable energy source to sustain park operations, and replace faulty culverts to improve roadway conditions during weather events.

The proposed project would reconstruct the South Entrance Fee Station area by restructuring the immediate roadway to provide additional lanes of traffic, both entering and exiting the park. Additional fee booths, traffic islands, and an employee parking area would be incorporated into the design to accommodate the number of employees required at the entrance station to facilitate park entry and would also create areas protected from moving traffic for employees. An increase in the number and size of the fee booths would also help eliminate instances where employees enter the roadway, or rove, to expedite park entry demands. A shade structure covering the fee booths and vehicle entry lanes would also provide a platform to install solar panels which would fully sustain the energy needs of the facility. Finally, two culverts, one north and one south of the Fee Station, would be rebuilt to adequately capture and channel stormwater runoff thereby reducing the overall risk of roadway hazards in the area.

The NPS encourages your participation throughout the National Environmental Policy Act (NEPA) process. At this time, ZION invites you to help identify concerns and express any ideas or comments regarding the proposed project.
